## Letter from the Editor

Dear Educators,

*People need to be passionate about issues in order to be motivated to go out and mark a ballot. There is a strong message in this about the general disassociation with politics. The question is, what is going to change that?*

These comments were made by Harry Neufeld last May after the voter turnout for B.C.'s provincial election was a record low of only 51% of eligible voters. [Link to the G&M article in the 'news' section below.] This low turnout was unexpected, as pollster's surveys predicted that over 90% in-



tended to vote and that there had been heavy advance turnout.

This outcome, after Mr. Neufeld, in his capacity as chief electoral officer, had pulled out all the

stops to encourage higher voter turnout — increasing the polling hours, advertising heavily, and updating the voters' list. How disappointing. How maddening.

Experts put forward many reasons — apathy, forgetfulness, election fatigue — but none of them are very satisfying. Voter turnout has been trending down for many years. I'm beginning to worry that we're taking our democratic system for granted. Even worse I suspect that we don't understand the system and how important we are to ensuring its strength. As we have witnessed on both sides of the border and overseas in recent years, democracy can be very fragile.



[EXCERPT — Christopher Bernard, 2009 Forum for Young Canadians participant and Grade 11 student at l'École Secondaire le Carrefour in Gatineau, Quebec, provided a personal account of his trip to France with the Canadian delegation attending the ceremonies commemorating D-Day, on June 6, 2009]

Everything began with a simple little e-mail. Yet, within just a few days, I was aboard the Prime Minister's plane headed for France so I could take part in the events commemorating the 65th anniversary of the June 6, 1944 D-Day landing in Normandy.

When I got to school on Monday, June 1, 2009, I had no idea that very soon, I was about experience one of the most unbelievable moments of my life. But that is what happened. When I opened my e-mail, I saw I had a message from the Forum's Executive Director, Ms. Dawn Pickering. I opened it right away and found out this was an invitation to be part of Canada's delegation during an official visit to France by Prime Minister Harper... WHAT! But it was true. WOW! Without hesitation, I grabbed this opportunity and I immediately started doing all I could to participate in this incredible project. I contacted the Executive Director of the Dominion Institute, Mr. Marc Chalifoux, who was responsible for this commemoration project. Following a brief interview, he told me they would get back to me by around noon the next day.

Never had I spent what seemed like such a long morning in school. Seconds felt like hours. The noontime hour finally arrived, and I got the news from Mr. Chalifoux: yes, Christopher, you're coming to France. And we are leaving this Friday! OH MY GOD! While the morning before I got the news had felt like a whole day, the rest of the week before we were to leave Friday morning felt like an entire year. [Civic duty? Why bother? The battle against voter apathy](#) -- David Parkins for **The Globe and Mail**, Thursday, September 24, 2009

Harry Neufeld, chief electoral officer for B.C., has heard every excuse under the sun for why people don't vote. But when he got up on May 12, election day in B.C., he was optimistic that voters would show up at his polls. Advance turnout was high. And a pollster's survey before the election showed 94 per cent of British Columbians intended to vote. They lied. The day ended with a record low turnout: Just 51 per cent of eligible voters made the effort to cast a ballot. "I can't say I wasn't disappointed," he said this week. Mr. Neufeld frets for the electoral process like a parent struggling with a wayward child. But his passion for the job comes with strictly neutral limits: He increased the polling hours, advertised heavily, updated the voter's list. He couldn't make people care. And more people than ever got up on election day and decided not to bother. A new report sheds some light on why voters opted to stay home. But it also offers discouraging news for campaigners who are preparing for a possible fall federal election. In the aftermath of the provincial election, BCStats commissioned a poll to delve into why people didn't vote. The reasons ranged from the innocent "I forgot" to the petulant "My vote doesn't count."
