History took place on Parliament Hill last Friday with the installation of Canada's 28th Governor General. Beyond the pomp and circumstance of the ceremony, it is important to understand the role that the Governor General plays in our Parliamentary system. It is more than tradition — it is one of the defining features of how Canada governs itself.

This was never made more clear than in the Fall of 2008, during the height of the economic crisis, when our Prime Minister requested from the Governor General that Parliament be 'prorogued'. For most of us, the role of Governor General is in large part a ceremonial one. At times we are aware that it is also one of process, as in the dissolution of Parliament which signals the call for a national election.



What happens in Ottawa on Parliament Hill is important. As citizens, understanding how our government works and participating in the democratic process is essential.

It is notable that our new Governor General, himself an educator at the university level, emphasized the

importance of education in his installation speech. This week's **Chalk Talk** features resources to help educators plan a school trip to our nation's capital where learning about our history is fun. 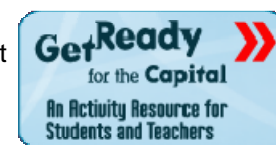

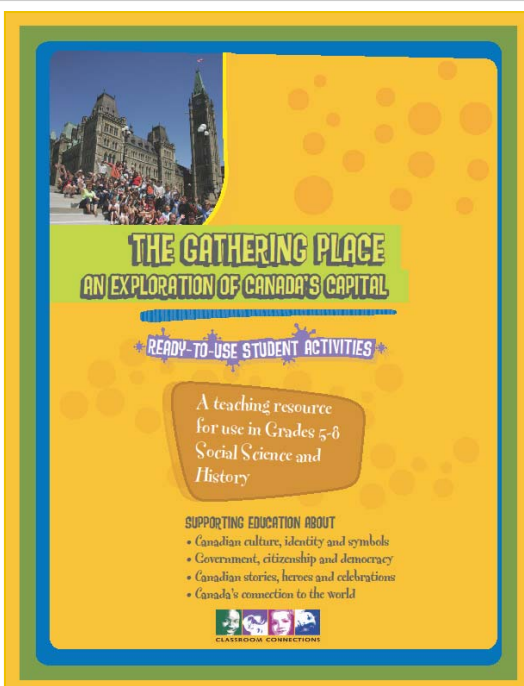


## A Great Way to Teach History
