Dear Educators,

Happy New Year to all! The first decade of the new millennium has now passed into the history books. In 2000, Adrienne Clarkson was Governor General, the first of three appointees who would hold that post before the end of 2010, and, Jean Chretien's tenure as Prime Minister was in its 7th of 10 years. Mr. Chretien would be succeeded by Paul Martin whose Liberal Party would lose power in 2006 to Stephen Harper and the Conservatives who have governed with two consecutive minority governments. In a single decade, Canadians have gone to the Polls in four federal elections.

It's difficult now to believe that our biggest preoccupation as the decade began was widespread concern over Y2K. While the anticipated threat of computer chaos never materialized, the unimaginable horror of September 11, 2001, which followed, was to change our world. That August marked the end of a wonderful visit from relatives from Europe. Just days after they returned home, the four, now infamous, planes crashed into the World Trade Centre, the Pentagon and a farmer's field in Pennsylvania. In January, 2002, the role of our military -- which had been primarily involved in 'peace-keeping' activities since WWII -- changed to an active combat role in Afghanistan, with over 150 Canadian lives lost to-date.

What goes on in Ottawa on Parliament Hill in the Senate and in the House of Commons is vital to our democracy. 2011 will see many provinces hold elections and there is some serious talk of a federal election in the offing. **Chalk Talk** will feature new classroom resources and programs designed to motivate students to learn about their government and become active, informed citizens. The FORUM experience brings students to Ottawa for a one-week intensive academic adventure that immerses them in the exciting world of national politics and public affairs. FORUM is a bilingual, non-partisan and AMAZING program to develop **leadership** and to learn about parliamentary democracy, how government works and how YOUR STUDENTS can make a difference in shaping Canada's future.

Spend a week on Parliament Hill. Learn How Government Works.

WHO: Up to 100 students (aged 15-19) from across Canada, at each session. Groups of 15 students are escorted and supervised throughout by adult Team Leaders.

WHERE: In Ottawa, Canada's capital. Most seminars and simulations are held on Parliament Hill. [Accommodations are in a downtown hotel.]

WHEN: Students participate in one of three Spring 2011 sessions: February 27, March 20 or March 27. Each session is 5 days long.
